Birth to Three – babies, toddlers and young children will be learning to:	Communication and Language	 Recognise and are calmed by a familiar and friendly voice. Make sounds to get attention in different ways (for example, crying when hungry or unhappy, making gurgling sounds, laughing, cooing or babbling)
	Personal, Social and Emotional Development	 Find ways to calm themselves, through being calmed and comforted by their key person. Establish their sense of self.
		 Express preferences and decisions. They also try new things and start establishing their autonomy
		 Thrive as they develop self-assurance.
		 Begin to show 'effortful control'. For example, waiting for a turn and resisting the strong impulse to grab what they want or push their way to the front. Be increasingly able to talk about and manage their emotions.
	Physical Development	 Show an increasing desire to be independent, such as wanting to feed themselves and dress or undress.
	Understanding the World	 Make connections between the features of their family and other families.

Three and Four- Year-Olds will be learning to:	Communication and Language	 Be able to express a point of view and to debate when they disagree with an adult or friend, using words as well as actions. Start a conversation with an adult or a friend and continue it for many turns.

Personal, Social and Emotional Development	 Select and use activities and resources, with help when needed. This helps them to achieve a goal they have chosen or one which is suggested to them.
	 Develop their sense of responsibility and membership of a community.
	 Become more outgoing with unfamiliar people, in the safe context of their setting.
	 Show more confidence in new social situations.
	 Play with one or more other children, extending and elaborating play ideas.
	 Help to find solutions to conflicts and rivalries. For example, accepting that not everyone can be Spider-Man in the game, and suggesting other ideas.
	 Increasingly follow rules, understanding why they are important.
	 Remember rules without needing an adult to remind them.
	 Develop appropriate ways of being assertive.
	• Talk with others to solve conflicts.
	 Talk about their feelings using words like 'happy', 'sad', 'angry' or 'worried'.
	 Understand gradually how others might be feeling.
	 Be increasingly independent in meeting their own care needs, e.g. brushing teeth, using the toilet, washing and drying their hands thoroughly.
	 Make healthy choices about food, drink, activity and toothbrushing.

Horizon

Three and FourYear-Olds will be learning to:	Physical Development	 Be increasingly independent as they get dressed and undressed. For example, putting coats on and doing up zips.
	Understanding the World	 Begin to make sense of their own life-story and family's history. Show interest in different occupations. Continue developing positive attitudes about the differences between people. Know that there are different countries in the world and talk about the differences they have experienced or seen in photos.
Children in Reception will be learning to:	Communication and Language	 Use talk to help work out problems and organise thinking and activities, and to explain how things work and why they might happen. Develop social phrases.
	Personal, Social and Emotional Development	 See themselves as a valuable individual. Build constructive and respectful relationships. Express their feelings and consider the feelings of others. Show resilience and perseverance in the face of challenge. Identify and moderate their own feelings socially and emotionally. Think about the perspectives of others. Manage their own needs. personal hygiene Know and talk about the different factors that support their overall health and wellbeing: regular physical activity healthy eating toothbrushing sensible amounts of 'screen time' having a good sleep routine being a safe pedestrian
	Physical Development	 Further develop the skills they need to manage the school day successfully: lining up and queuing mealtimes
	Understanding the World	 Talk about members of their immediate family and community. Name and describe people who are familiar to them. Recognise that people have different beliefs and celebrate special times in different ways.

ELG	Communication and Language	Listening, Attention and Understanding	 Hold conversation when engaged in back-and-forth exchanges with their teachers and peers.
		Speaking	• Express their ideas and feelings about their experiences using full sentences, including use of past, present and future tenses and making use of conjunctions, with modelling and support from their teacher.
	Personal, Social and Emotional Development	Self-Regulation	 Show an understanding of their own feelings and those of others, and begin to regulate their behaviour accordingly. Set and work towards simple goals, being able to wait for what they want and control their immediate impulses when appropriate. Give focused attention to what the teacher says, responding appropriately even when engaged in activity, and show an ability to follow instructions impulsion accordingly.
		Managing Self	 ability to follow instructions involving several ideas or actions. Be confident to try new activities and show independence, resilience and perseverance in the face of challenge. Explain the reasons for rules, know right from wrong and try to behave accordingly. Manage their own basic hygiene and personal needs, including dressing, going to the toilet and understanding the importance of healthy food choices.
		Building Relationships	 Work and play cooperatively and take turns with others. Form positive attachments to adults and friendships with peers. Show sensitivity to their own and others' needs.
	Physical Development	Gross Motor Skills	 Negotiate space and obstacles safely, with consideration for themselves and others.
	Understanding the World	Past and Present	 Talk about the lives of people around them and their roles in society.
Year 1	PSHRE	we expect schools to use their PSHE education programme to equip pupils with a sound understanding of risk and with the knowledge and skills necessary to make safe and informed decisions. Schools should seek to use PSHE education to build, where appropriate, on the statutory content already outlined in the national curriculum, the basic school curriculum and in statutory guidance on: drug education, financial education, sex and relationship education (SRE) and the importance of physical activity and diet for a healthy lifestyle.
