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Dear Families,

This school year we have been implementing the PSHE (Personal, Social and Health Education) Programme across our school called Jigsaw, the mindful approach to PSHE.

The lessons since September, have built children's emotional literacy, self-esteem and knowledge of who they are and how they relate to each other and the world in a positive and healthy way. They cover all areas of statutory requirements for the delivery of health and relationship's education. We are sure you will have heard the children talk about the Jigsaw Friends and Calm Me time.

The Summer Term Puzzles (units) are about Relationships (unit 1) and Changing Me (unit 2). The Changing Me Puzzle includes, in every year group, 2 or 3 lessons to help children understand their bodies. There is a very serious safeguarding aspect to this work, giving children the vocabulary to correctly and clearly identify specific body parts. Safeguarding our children and only sharing age appropriate but anatomically correct terminology is key to these units of work; the children in Years 1 and 2 are learning correct terminology for body parts and doing the foundation work for learning that will follow in later year groups. We would normally invite you into school for a meeting to share this information with you however, due to covid restrictions we are including the following information for you, taken from the Jigsaw information leaflet.

Jigsaw's 'Changing Me' unit is taught over a period of 6 weeks, usually in the second half of the summer term. Each year group will be taught appropriate to their age and developmental stage, building on the previous years' learning. Please note: at no point will a child be taught something that is inappropriate; and if a question from a child arises and the teacher feels it would be inappropriate to answer, (for example, because of its mature or explicit nature), the child will be encouraged to ask his/her parents or carers at home. The question will not be answered to the child or class if it is outside the remit of that year group's programme.

At Jigsaw we believe this work is an important part of safeguarding children as knowledge empowers them, helping them to stay safe.

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The government made Relationships Education and Health Education statutory for all primary schools in September 2020. We hope you will be in agreement with us that this work is vitally important for children, that it needs to be done age-appropriately and that the Jigsaw Programme gives us a secure framework in which to do this. However, we do as always want to work in partnership with parents and carers, and also wish to inform you of your legal right to withdraw your children from some aspects of this work. We have provided the whole table of Jigsaw units so that you can see how they develop across the two schools, as the Junior School are also using this programme.

Where parents/carers once had the choice to remove their child from all Sex Education lessons each year, following updated statutory guidance for Health and Relationships Education which came into place in September 2020, the vast majority of what is now required of schools is statutory and must be taught to all pupils. This content is covered in black in the table above. Health Education is now statutory, it is incredibly important that all children receive this content, covering topics such as friendships, positive relationships and how to stay safe.

Parents/carers do have the right to withdraw their child/children from any lessons which cover human reproduction, and this content is shown in red in the table above. However, we do, as always, want to work in partnership with parents and carers and we hope that you, like us, will see the materials in Jigsaw as educationally sound and beneficial to our children.
