Dear Parents.



It has been a poignant day in school where children have learnt about the significance of the poppy and how important it is for peace. The children were fascinated to learn that during WW1, the children in this school were moved out and taught at other schools and in community halls so that the school could be refurbished and used as a hospital to treat the wounded. The children in Y2 have been learning about WW11 and have been into the shelter with torches and written letters and accounts. The children have been shown pictures of the poppies on the Hoe and I created a picture of poppies growing in the fields after a conflict and linked the red colour of the poppy to red blood. Making the story relevant to our youngest children, we looked at peaceful playtimes and concentrated on our 'Kind' rules.

Governors

We share our governing body with the Junior School and all our governors are busy supporting and challenging the schools to provide the very best opportunities for all our children.
